Founded by three Detroit area Lions Clubs members in 1939, Leader Dogs for the Blind provides dog guides to people who are blind or visually impaired to enhance their mobility, independence and quality of life. Each year, over 270 participants attend our 26- day residential training program to be paired with a dog guide. This is a life-changing event that opens the doors to independence, safety and self-worth for many of the participants in the Leader Dog program.



World Services for the Blind

Lions World Services for the Blind was founded in 1947 by Roy Kumpe to serve people who are blind and visually impaired who needed to learn independent living skills or job training skills that considered the special requirements of their individual visual impairments. The goal of the rehabilitation center then, and today, is to prepare the individual who is blind or visually impaired to function independently in our "sighted" society.



The Lions Club International Foundation provides funds for relief from disasters such as hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes, and floods. It also provides funds to aid in construction of hospitals, clinics, schools and other needed projects.

Texas Lions Foundation

Since its founding nearly 37 years ago, our District 2-S3 has contributed \$239,000 to the Foundation. In that same time period, \$782,000 has been distributed to Texas Lions Clubs for Humanitarian Projects and Disaster Relief in Texas. Congratulations – YOU continue to make a difference in Texas! For the current Lions Year that began July 1, 2020, 41 Clubs in the District have already become 100% Clubs supporting the Foundation. If you have not made your 100% Club contribution, there is still ample time to do so. Contributions from the 41 Clubs totaled more than \$3,500 and qualify each Club to receive a recognition banner patch which would have been presented at the Mid-Winter Conference – the plan now is to present the banner patches at the District Convention on May 1, 2021.

How We Serve

There are 1.35 million Lion members in 45,000 clubs world-wide. We are active in more than 208 countries and geographic areas. We conduct vision and health screenings, build parks, support eye hospitals, award scholarships, assist youth, provide help in time of disaster, and much more.

A Brief History of Lions International

In June of 1917, the Melvin Jones Business Circle of Chicago contacted several similar organizations and held their first convention in August in Dallas, TX. The first International Lions Club was established in Windsor, Ontario, in 1920. In 1925, Helen Keller challenged the Lions to become the "Knights of the Blind." Lions Club International had its major expansion between 1950-1970. Women were admitted to become Lions in 1987.

History of the Garden Ridge Lions Club

A community-wide effort to help individuals and families in times of need or disaster has long been a characteristic of the rural Southwest. This willingness to assist neighbors in times of crisis seemed inherent to the early residents of the Garden Ridge community. The rapid development of the area during the early 1970's brought the realization that some type of formal organization was needed to grow with the community while also meeting their increased charitable and civic needs. This realization "planted the seed" and resulted in the founding of the Garden Ridge Lions Club in early 1972. Formal presentation of the Charter was made on April 25, 1973, at a banquet held at the Randolph Air Force Base Non-Commissioned Officers' Club.

Regional, State, and International Charities Supported Texas Lions Camp

The Texas Lions Camp is a 500-acre camp located in Kerrville, Texas, for physically handicapped, Down Syndrome, and insulin-dependent diabetic children. The camp was founded April 4, 1949, and had 40 excited kids for the first camp held on June 8, 1953. The first summer the camp served 236 children and now averages about 1300 per summer. The camping sessions offer the kids swimming, horseback riding, fishing, archery, and nature studies. All camping and services are provided at no cost to the children or their families. We spend three Saturdays every year, approximately 300 work hours, getting the Texas Lions Camp painted and cleaned-up for that year's campers.

How We Fund Our Programs

Primarily, we donate our time and talent to fund raising and local humanitarian projects. Our primary fund raising project is the Annual Fish Fry, BBQ, Raffle, and Auction held every year on the first Saturday in October at the Garden Ridge Community Center. Come out and support us!

Dear Garden Ridge Lions,

With three in-person meetings under our belt, we are looking forward to continuing as we reinvigorate our Lions Club. Guest speakers have been top-notch thanks to Lion Mark Frye, and as we proceed into March – April we will get the GRLC 2021 – 2022 BoD election completed on March 24th. With us on the 24th, Dr. Calvin Finch will talk about gardening post-2021 Texas ice-age. Seriously, Dr. Finch is a recognized horticultural expert and will be talking about gardening. Preparations for our 2021 GRLC FFB&A will also be on the agenda. Then on April 14th, two speakers, Dr. Charles Johnson and Ms. Tori Howard, will discuss what I hope will become a new GRLC volunteer activity – Emergency Response Team certification and participation.

As many are aware, our Wednesday meetings are combination in-person and virtual events. While the virtual format has had its challenges, we will continue covering the meeting to enable those unable to attend a way to participate. Food service has varied from pizza to the latest, a Mexican dinner that was the idea of Mandy Hagy with help from Ginger Stiehler. Mandy and Ginger were a hit, and the cost was so reasonable that the board is assessing future food service options. The ladies will return on March 24th. More to follow on the assessment.

Our 2021 Fish Fry Barbeque and Auction is also coming down the pike and we must start the planning this month to be ready for the "First Saturday in October." The first steps will be soliciting volunteers for all the subcommittees, and that will kick-off March 24th with the sign-up board being displayed at our Lions Club meeting. This year will still be a challenge given that COVID will still be with us in some form or fashion. We will have to be creative in our planning and what we will offer. For example, will our auction have to include a virtual component? Do we have to redesign our raffle ticket process? How will our food service be impacted, and will we be able to manage the number of diners inside the community center? We pray most COVID concerns will be mitigated, but Fortuna Favet Fortibus (for any Carrier Wing 14 alums) so we will boldly press forward.

Finally, I want to make a pitch for the 2021 Lions Club International Convention. It will be virtual this year and open to all Lions and Leos around the world. The convention is scheduled for June 25-29. Here is the registration link: https://lcicon.lionsclubs.org/

Gary Fuchs, our 2-S3 regional president, is pushing for maximum participation for two reasons. Since the convention is virtual this is an excellent opportunity for 2-S3 Lions and Leos to actually experience an LCI convention. More importantly, our district has a candidate for International Director, PCC T.J. Tijerina, and every vote 2-S3 clubs can muster will get him elected. Each club is allowed one vote, no matter what our membership count. However, 38 members registering gets us two votes, and if 63 members register, we get three votes (for math majors the formula is multiples of 25 + 13 for every one added vote increment).

The registration fee for the virtual convention is \$50 until March 31st, then \$75 beginning April 1. For Leos it will be \$30 regardless of date. We will talk more about this event, but signup before the end of March to get the \$50 rate! Thanks, Lion Bill F.

Lions Collect Used Eyeglasses

The members of the Garden Ridge Lions Club have accumulated, over the past several months, about 8000 pair of used eyeglasses. The club sorted and packed them for delivery to the Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center (TLERC) in Midland, Texas. The TLERC program is in need of used eyeglasses; there are over 1.5 billion, that's billion with a "b," individuals in developing nations that need and can't afford the simplest eye care. We as Lions can do our part in filling this hole by collecting used eyeglasses for recycling. The center will process and distribute the used eyeglasses to needy individuals throughout the world. Once received at TLERC, glasses go through a "First Sort." Since people will not see clearly from severely scratched lenses, these must be sorted out. TLERC will also throw out very worn or broken frames as well. The rest of the first sort consists of separating glasses: prescription from non-prescription, clear from tinted lenses, baby/small child glasses from adult, and "fancy" frames, as well as those with precious metal in them from normal frames.

Finally, the glasses are separated by right eye prescription into single vision or bifocal, near or far -sighted, and then quarter diopters (a diopter is a measurement of the lens strength). Each of these sub-divisions is then placed into special boxes holding about 50 glasses of that prescription. A com-

pleted set of all the combinations ready to ship to a mission or clinic around the world would contain about 7600 pairs of glasses. In the end we might have to sort through 50,000 pair of glasses just to come up with one complete set of boxes to ship, because some prescriptions are harder to find than others. So please keep on collecting!

Community residents may deposit unneeded eyeglasses in the Garden Ridge Lions eyeglass collection box located in the Garden Ridge Library. The eyeglasses from our collection box provide improved vision not only for many people but also for our favorite teddy bear.

TEXAS LIONS CAMP NEWS

Feb. 6 was historic as members of the camp board joined the Executive Committee for groundbreaking on Phase I of implementation of the new master plan. Following the meeting, attendees gathered on the site of the now demolished bunk house 2 for the groundbreaking ceremony. Finally, the board authorized offering TLC-4-families this summer as a way to have children with special medical needs and their families on campus this summer. With the leadership of President/CEO Stephen Mabry and his management team, a new program to use the facilities to strengthen the family unit and the relevancy of TLC as an organization to families with a special medical needs child is being developed to supplement last summer's TLC2U virtual camp which will be available to children whose families cannot schedule a time on campus. It is important to understand that TLC is unable to offer summer camp as we have known it under the current COVID environment. Registration will begin soon for summer camp, so check the website, www.lionscamp,com, frequently for updated information. Details for TLC 4-Families still must be finalized, but the general plan is to offer a shorter-length camping experience for the entire family with a mix of structured activities and free time. In compliance with social distancing requirements and the need to maintain "pods" of cohabiting people, family units will be housed separately in the 15 wings of the existing bunkhouses. This is an exciting opportunity for TLC to serve families who likely need a break during this pandemic. Finding a way to safely house small family units and conduct small group activities makes it possible to continue to serve children with special medical needs this summer. Several weeks will be available for families with a diabetic child. The board amended the construction plan approved in November to accelerate the construction of the Eagle Trail while constructing two of the Northern Quad larger bunkhouses. Eagle Trail will provide 12 selfcontained one-room cabins, two-room cottages and three-room small group homes. This modification will facilitate serving small pods of people, and post-pandemic, will provide opportunities for housing medical and leadership staff during summer camp and for leasing for other purposes.

Garden Ridge Lions cleared a nature trail at Texas Lions Camp

My thanks to the below lions and family members who participated in our March 6 lions camp work day. We were able to clear brush for a new trail at the camp. We managed to clear a path 6 to 10 feet wide over a distance in excess of one mile over rocky and uneven terrain. 


Garden Ridge Lions Perform Hearing Testing In Schools

In a typical year prior to COVID-19, the Garden Ridge Lions Club would conduct hearing screening in conjunction with the sight screening done by New Braunfels and Canyon Lake Noon Lions Clubs.

For example, in 2013, thirty-five Garden Ridge Lions and their family members performed hearing testing on students in selected grades in the Comal Independent School District, the New Braunfels Independent School District, and several private schools. The Hearing Testing and New Braunfels Lions Vision Testing programs were accomplished to meet State requirements. Hearing testing was done to determine if a student had a hearing problem that could affect their performance in school. The testing commenced in September and concluded in November and covered a total of 30 schools; we utilized a combined total of 115 certified testers (all Lions and Lions helpers) and screened nearly 6,000 students in both Comal and New Braunfels ISDs. The results of the hearing testing were forwarded to school nurses for evaluation and further action should the need exist. Historically, a small number of students (around 1 percent) are found to need further hearing evaluation and corrective treatment. This testing was designed to identify hearing problems at an early age and allow for corrective action at that time.

We are nearing the time to get our Lions back to work screening the youth of Comal County. Is this the year for you to get involved?



The MELVIN JONES FELLOWSHIP

The International Association of Lions Clubs began as the dream of Chicago businessman Melvin Jones in 1917. He believed that local business clubs should expand their horizons from purely professional concerns to the betterment of the world at large.

When Melvin Jones developed the concept of a community service organization, it is highly unlikely that his vision projected the scope of what is now Lions Club International: the world's largest service club organization with more than 42,000 clubs and 1.4 million members worldwide.

Nor is it likely that Melvin Jones imagined at that June 1917 meeting in Chicago that millions of dollars would be disbursed to all parts of the world through the association's charitable arm, Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF).

As a fitting tribute to the founder of Lions Club International, the foundation's highest commendation for humanitarian service is named in his honor - The Melvin Jones Fellowship. Created in 1973, the fellowship recognizes a commitment to humanitarian service. It is not an award in the tradition of Lions awards, but an honor given to individuals.

The commitment of Melvin Jones Fellows is demonstrated through acts of generosity, compassion, and concern for others. Thousands of lives have been dramatically touched because of what that commitment has done for them. The fellowship is best understood as an avenue for accomplishing a tremendous amount of good as donated funds are distributed to meet humanitarian needs in communities worldwide.

In the forty-eight-year history of the Garden Ridge Lions Club, only thirty-five members have received the Melvin Jones Fellow. 




Featured Lion Mark A. Delaney

Lion Mark A. Delaney was born in Brooklyn, New York, and attended St. Francis Xavier High School in Manhattan, a unique Military School founded in 1847 by the Jesuits. After graduating, Mark attended the College of Holy Cross in Worcester, Massachusetts, and at graduation, received a commission as an Air Force Lieutenant. He spent 1958-59 in Korea with a Matador missile unit, as a targets officer and as commander of a missile squadron. Lots of interesting experiences, including living with 35 others and two rats in a tin hut with no running water, and landing on an island beach north of the 38th parallel.

He returned to Florida with a missile unit, and then on to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, with a fighter squadron. This was followed by tours at headquarters, Tactical Air Command; Air Force representative on the staff of the Commander, Marine Air Forces Atlantic; Operations officer in Vi-





Upon leaving Vietnam, Mark was assigned to Tokyo and the surrounding area for three years. Part of that period, he spent in the American Embassy in Manila as commander of a unit there. He then reported back to several positions at the Pentagon and with other agencies in the Washington, D.C., area before transferring to Germany for four years. He served there as Executive Assistant to both the Director and Deputy Director of Intelligence of the U.S. European Command, and as the Command's representative on an at-large materials committee in the United Kingdom.

The late seventies saw Mark in Colorado Springs, working inside of Cheyenne Mountain as Chief of the Threat and Intelligence Operations Center Divisions for the joint U.S. Air Defense Command, the binational North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), and the U.S. Air Force Space Command. Part of his tour was spent as NORAD's representative to the Canada-U.S. (CANUS) planning committee in Ottawa, Canada.

Mark then returned to Japan as Deputy Chief of Staff, Intelligence, 5th Air Force, responsible for Air Force intelligence activities in Japan and Korea. Concurrently, he served as Joint President of the U.S.-Japan Intelligence Subcommittee. He returned to Omaha in 1981 to take over the 1,500-person 544th Strategic Intelligence Wing, the largest intelligence production organization among the five services. He held that command position for three years, and retired from the Air Force in January, 1985.

Hanson Aggregates – Servtex Quarry partners with area schools and cities for sixth annual Food Drive for RACAP

For many school-aged children in the area, summer is a time of hunger. That's because when school is out, many children don't have access to the regular, nutritious meals that schools provide.

For the sixth year in a row, Hanson Aggregates – Servtex Quarry is helping to ensure all children in the area have enough to eat by organizing its Food Drive for RACAP (Randolph Area Christian Assistance Program), taking place April 22 – May 3. RACAP is a Schertz-based food pantry serving portions of Guadalupe, Comal, and Bexar counties.

To meet the increased demand from families with school-aged children during the summer months, RACAP is asking for donations of 1-2 lb. bags of rice and dried beans, canned soups, canned pasta and meat, boxed meat helpers, ramen noodles, and other shelf-stable items.

Hanson Aggregates –Servtex Quarry is coordinating the food drive with help from other community partners. During the week of the food drive, food will be collected at city halls in Garden Ridge, Cibolo, Schertz, Selma, and Universal City, along with participating schools in these communities. Residents of these communities are asked to donate non-perishable food items at their local city hall, where Servtex Quarry will collect the food and deliver it to RACAP.

Last year, Servtex Quarry worked with area communities and schools to collect more than 9,600 pounds of food to help fill RACAP shelves.

RACAP relies solely on churches, businesses, and individuals to help stock its pantry and does not receive any government funding. Services provided to clients include food, rent assistance, and help with prescription medications and utilities.

Servtex Quarry, located in Garden Ridge, produces several million tons of crushed stone per year, which is used mainly for road, residential, and commercial construction in San Antonio, South and East Texas.


